We have started the 4th quarter. It is remarkable how fast another school year has gone. The seniors are down to 7 weeks until their graduation. Regular March 19, 2018 Meeting 7:00 P.M.

Meridian Public School Board of Education met on Monday, March 19, 2018, as per notice in the Fairbury Journal-News.

President VanWesten called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The open meeting law information was presented. Members present were Scheer, Sobotka, Bartels, Vorderstrasse, Miller, and VanWesten. Also present were Superintendent Kort, Principal Scott, and Ms. Hanzlik.

There was nothing new to add to the agenda.

No comments were made by the public.

Sobotka moved and Miller seconded to approve the consent agenda as follows:

1. Minutes of the Sunday, February 18, 2018 Regular Meeting
2. District Financial Report
3. Activity Fund Report
4. Hot Lunch Fund Report
5. Bills

Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-

aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Principal Scott and Superintendent Kort gave the Curriculum Report. Meridian is looking at upgrading the elementary reading program next fall. Mr. Scott is currently working on Ag Education classes for next year.

Discussion was held on approving Policy 5006 and Appendix 1. A motion was made by Scheer and seconded by Vorderstrasse to approve Policy 5006 and Appendix 1 as presented. New class capacity limits will be 20 students in high school classes and 16 students in elementary classes. Special education limits will be 15 students in high school and 12 students in elementary. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Sobotka moved and Scheer seconded to accept the resignation of Mary Houchin, with regrets, and to thank her for 35 years of service to the Meridian District. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Bartels moved and Miller seconded to approve the hiring of Certified Staff. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Discussion was held on the hiring of new staff.

Bartels moved and Miller seconded to approve the hiring of Leslie Drees as the new Elementary Music Teacher. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.



Scheer moved and Bartels seconded to approve the hiring of Takota Thiem as the Secondary English Teacher. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Sobotka moved and Miller seconded to approve the hiring of Trevor Hoins as the 5th Grade homeroom teacher and 4th-6th Grade science teacher. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Vorderstasse moved and Scheer seconded to approve the contract for Principal Scott pending salary negotiation. Vote taken: Vorderstrasse-aye, Bartels-aye, Sobotka-aye, Scheer-aye, Miller-aye, and VanWesten-aye. Motion carried 6-0.

Discussion was held on Superintendent Kort's contract. This item was tabled until the April Meeting.

Discussion was held on the progression of the Meridian Beef Program. We will be purchasing a deep freeze for storage and will have a beef processed yet this year.

Testing season begins soon, with the juniors taking the ACT, and 3rd-8th grade taking the NSCAS (formerly NeSA).



Spring is officially here, which means it's time to start thinking about schedules for next year! I will be meeting with students in grades 6-11 to get an idea of the classes they would like to take. Once a schedule is set for next year, students will have a chance to finalize their selections. As a reminder, all Meridian high school students need 4 years of English and Social Studies, 3 years of Math and Science, 2 years of Fine Arts, 1 year each of Technology, Physical Education, and Vocational or Foreign Language. Parents, please be sure to discuss your student's plan for the upcoming year. Once again, next year's Junior and Senior students will have an opportunity to take dual-credit online college classes. Certain requirements to participate in these classes do apply. Right now, we utilize college resources through Peru State and Southeast Community College. Students also have an opportunity to participate in SENCAP's Career Academy, which is a great way to earn college credits free of charge! Students have been informed of these offerings. Parents, if you have questions regarding these opportunities, please talk to your child or feel free to contact me.

Seniors ... it's decision time! If you haven't done so already, it's time to choose the college that's the right fit for

you. Compare your college acceptance letters, financial aid award notifications, and campus visit notes. List the pros and cons of each school using the following criteria:

- **Location** – Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.
- **Cost** – Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in student and parent loans will you need to cover expenses?
- **Academic program** – Which college offers the degree program that best fits your career interests? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other degree programs that interest you?
- **Student life** – Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? Do you like the living arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by **May 1** and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and any financial aid, to another student.

REMINDER: Local scholarships are due **APRIL 15th!** The application forms for all scholarships are found on the school website under the administration-counselor tab. Be sure to follow directions and complete all steps of each application. Also, you need to let me know of any scholarships you receive, as those scholarships will be announced at graduation.

If you haven't completed the FAFSA yet, now is the time to do so! Remember, the FAFSA will provide you with a Student Aid Report, which will determine your financial aid eligibility for next year.



Juniors: Many of you have taken the opportunity this spring to visit a college of interest. I would encourage more of you to do this if you can find time around spring events. If you need help scheduling a visit, let me know! When you visit, remember to take a "Campus Visit Form" with you so the office can mark it as an excused absence. Reminder: The registration deadline for the June 9th ACT is May 15th. Go to www.actstudent.org to register. Fee waivers are available for students who qualify for free/reduced lunch – visit with Ms. Hermsmeier if you would like a waiver. New NSCAS Summative Assessment Measures Student Performance Takes less time, reveals deeper information, and helps address learning roadblocks.

This school year, the Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System (NSCAS) Summative assessment replaces the Nebraska School Accountability (NeSA) tests in:

- English Language Arts and Math** Grades 3–8
- Science** Grades 5 and 8

This new, computer-adaptive culminating assessment measures student performance against Nebraska's content area standards, showing how learning compares to expectations.

Testing dates are March 19–April 27, 2018 and make-up week is April 30–May 4, 2018. Meridian will have a schedule for testing students, so the students should be aware when they will be testing. Don't forget to make sure your child(ren) get a good night's rest, eat breakfast on the day of the assessment, and stay positive!

The NSCAS (pronounced, "en-skass") Summative assessment adapts dynamically based on each student's ability and includes innovative, interactive question formats that

engage students and enable them to demonstrate higher order thinking. As a result, it will take less time for students to complete and will provide deeper information about what they know.

Results from the spring 2018 administration will be available in the fall of 2018. Starting in 2019, results will be available shortly after the close of the testing window, giving parents and educators valuable information about student performance ahead of the next school year.

At the high school level, the ACT college entrance exam, provided to all juniors, will continue to serve as the summative assessment in English language arts, math, and science. The juniors will take this test on April 3.

We have a few left from the previous years if you forgot to order at that time. See Mrs. Soukup for the year you are missing.






