President Bartels called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. The open meeting law information was presented.

Roll call was taken: Barton – present, Niederklein – present, Rut – present, Davis – present, and Bartels – present. Also present was Superintendent Kort, Principal Asche and Principal Hull.

Nothing new was added to the agenda.

Niederklein moved and Barton seconded to excuse Sobotka from the meeting. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Rut – aye, Davis – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

No comments were heard from the public.

Rut moved and Davis seconded to approve the consent agenda as presented.

Ice and snow could be forecast any day now. Driving and/or walking can be dangerous in winter conditions. The following are tips for walking and driving on ice or snow.

If you are walking:

• Wear proper footwear: Choose flat shoes with rubber soles for better traction. Avoid high-heeled or leathersoled shoes. Page 2



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 Walk like a penguin: Take small steps, point your toes out slightly, and keep your center of gravity over your front leg.

• Keep your hands out of your pockets: This helps you keep your balance and protect yourself if you start to fall.

- Go slowly: Walk at a slower pace and lean forward slightly.
- Use handrails: Hold onto handrails when using stairs.
- Avoid carrying heavy bags: Avoid carrying heavy shopping bags, especially on steps.
- Sidestep down steps or curbs: When exiting a vehicle, use your vehicle for support.
- Be aware of the temperature: Ice is easier to walk on at 0°F or -20°F, but it's much slipperier when it's melting.
- Find a path around ice: When you can, try to find a path around snow or ice.

If you are driving:

- **Drive slowly**: Reduce your speed to increase tire contact and control.
- Accelerate gradually: Allow your tires time to gain traction on the road.
- Avoid cruise control: Cruise control can increase the chance of losing control of your vehicle.
- **Fit winter tires**: Winter tires provide more traction on ice, slush, and snow than regular tires.
- Know your brakes: Brake gently using slow, even motions. Antilock brakes (ABS) may not work well on ice and snow.
- Prepare your vehicle: Check your brakes, tires, battery, and heating system. Switch to winter-grade oil for better engine performance.
- Maintain a safe following distance: Keep a distance of at least 6-8 seconds from the car in front.
- Use higher gears: Driving in a higher gear can reduce wheel spin.
- Avoid sudden movements: Accelerate, brake, and steer gradually to maintain control.
- Don't attempt to stop suddenly or turn sharply: Braking harshly or accelerating too quickly can cause your wheels to spin and you could skid.

2nd Semester Schedule Changes

All 7-12 students interested in making changes to their 2nd semester schedule should do so before the holiday break. Please plan to do this the week of December 16-20. Meridian offers different electives each semester, and dual-credit classes are available for juniors and seniors. Parents: If you have questions on your child's schedule, please call or email Mrs. Hermsmeier at school.

Freshman to Seniors... College Timeline will keep you on track to college EducationQuest has a *College Timeline* (https://www.educationquest.org/myeducationquest/college-timeline/) for students in grades 9-12 that spells out steps you should take during fall, winter, spring, and summer of each year to plan for college.

The Timeline also allows you to add your own tasks, get reminders when it's time to complete tasks, and check off tasks when they're complete. You can access these features by creating and/or logging into your MyEducationQuest account at EducationQuest.org.

Check it out and give it a try. It will make the college planning process more manageable!

ACT Registration

This is a reminder that to register for the ACT, an account needs to be created at www.actstudent.org. From here, you will fill in specific information and also select your testing date and site. Each ACT costs \$68.00, but if you qualify for free or reduced lunches, you may request a fee waiver from Mrs. Hermsmeier. Our school code is 282-345. Please feel free to contact Mrs. Hermsmeier with any questions or concerns. Juniors, earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year. You must register by January 3rd, for the January 20th ACT, by February 28th, for the April 5th ACT, and/or by May 9th, for the June 14th ACT. Keep in mind that all juniors will be taking the ACT at school in April.

Seniors...have you submitted your college applications?

If you haven't submitted your college admission applications yet, it's time to get serious! Contact your top college choices for application deadlines and procedures. Ask if the admission application is also the application college-based for scholarships. If not, ask about the scholarship application process. By now, you should have applied to your top three colleges, and you should also be working on upcoming scholarships. The counseling webpage and the senior google classroom is updated with periodically! scholarships Please make sure you know deadlines for scholarships offered by the college(s) of your choice.

Senior FAFSA Information (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

Seniors, December you will be able to file for FAFSA! You'll need to complete the form before your college's priority date (typically March 1 or April 1) to apply for federal, state, and college-based financial aid. You and a parent can complete the form at FAFSA.gov. Before you start, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You'll need them to access and sign the FAFSA.

What to expect after you submit your FAFSA

The FAFSA opens in December so many of you will soon complete and submit your form. Here's what happens next:

- * Expect a Student Aid Report (SAR). You'll receive it via an email link if you provided an email address on your FAFSA. The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received, and if you need to take further action to process your FAFSA.
- * Make sure you applied for admission to colleges you listed on your FAFSA. Colleges who receive your FAFSA results typically won't send you a financial aid package until you've applied and have been accepted to the school.
- * Watch for verification requests. The college(s) you listed on your FAFSA might request verification

of your FAFSA information. If so, send the required documents to the colleges' financial aid office. The college will not process your financial aid until they receive the documents.

* Watch for financial aid award notifications. The colleges you applied to – and listed on your FAFSA – will send you a financial aid award notification detailing the types and amounts of aid they're offering based on your financial need.

Winning the scholarship Game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

- * Don't ever pay for scholarship searches! Use free resources such as ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org with over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. Free national sites include Peterson's, FindTuition, Cappex, and Chegg.
- * Visit your school counselor often for information about local scholarships.
- * Focus on local and college-specific scholarships because you're more likely to earn them.
- * Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- * Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them at least two weeks advance notice and a specific deadline.
- * Tailor your essay to the scholarship. Ask an English teacher to read your essay and offer advice on making a big impact. Your essay will need to stand out from other applications.

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



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




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
