Meridian Public School Board of Education met on October 14, 2024, as per notice in the Fairbury Journal News.

President Bartels called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m. The open meeting law information was presented.

Roll call was taken: Barton – present, Niederklein – present, Sobotka – present, Rut – present, and Bartels – present. Also present were Superintendent Kort and Principal Hull.

Nothing new was added to the agenda.

Niederklein moved and Barton seconded to excuse Davis from the meeting. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Sobotka – aye, Rut – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

Comments were heard from the public.

Rut moved and Barton seconded to approve the consent agenda as presented.

Principal Hull presented the Curriculum Report to the Board.

Sobotka moved and Rut seconded to Approve Policy 5006 to set the class maximum numbers in regard to option enrollment. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Sobotka – aye, Rut – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

Rut moved and Barton seconded to approve the training schedule for school employees as set by the August inservice schedule. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Sobotka – aye, Rut – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

Superintendent Kort gave an update on technology and an overview of the upcoming plans at Meridian for technology.

Superintendent Kort updated the Board on the verbal audit report received from Dana Cole. The final audit books will be available in November.

Barton moved and Sobotka seconded to approve the purchase of a 2020 Ford Expedition with a trade-in value of \$10,000.00 for the 2014 Chevy van in the current fleet. The cost, with trade in, is \$24,294.00. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Sobotka – aye, Rut – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

Niederklein moved and Barton seconded to approve the Meridian Education Association (MEA) as negotiators for the 2026-2027 school year. Vote taken: Barton – aye, Niederklein – aye, Sobotka – aye, Rut – aye, and Bartels – aye. Motion passed 5-0.

Principal Hull presented the Principals' Reports to the Board.

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Red Ribbon Week:

The end of October was filled with fun and presentations for our Meridian students. Our overall week theme was "Life is a Movie. Film Drug Free." The daily themes were the following: "Monday (Wear Red) :: "Roll out the Red Carpet to be Drug Free"; Tuesday (Western) :: "Gitty Up to Good Decisions"; Wednesday (Super Hero) :: "With Great Power, Comes Great Responsibility"; Thursday (Disney/Animated) :: "Drug Free, to Infinity and Beyond." Monday the students and staff were invited to wear Red to pose for a picture with the DEA presenter, Amanda Frazier. She spoke to students in grades K-12 about the dangers of drugs. Many other speakers came during the week. Our SRO, Nate, visited with students; Dr. Brandon Mowinkle presented "Write Your Own Story"; and Meridian Alumni, Breanna Miller presented to build awareness for mental health/substance abuse use in small communities. Thursday, we enjoyed dancing to the cupid shuffle



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during PE and Study Hall. If you have not done so, please take a few moments to talk to your child about the activities they participated in this week.

Career Academy/Dual Credit Classes:

High school students who want to explore a career field and are interested in getting a first-hand look at what college classes will be like by taking a dual-credit college class for second semester, should check out SENCAP's Career Academy. Besides the experience gained, the other big benefit is the cost. Southeast Community College-Beatrice and Meridian will cover the full cost of tuition, which means the only cost to the student is the textbook. This option is for juniors and seniors, but sophomores can be considering the option for next year. check out Please https:// www.southeast.edu/sencap or talk to Ms. Hermsmeier for more information.

Junior and Senior students also have the option of taking dual-credit college classes from Peru State College at halfcost tuition price. They can also take courses through Doane University or other options that they have found. Students are encouraged to stop by Mrs. Hermsmeier's office in the next few weeks if they are interested in taking a college class second semester. Class sizes are limited, so early registration is encouraged.

EducationQuest – A Useful Tool: Seniors...a reminder of what to do this fall...

There's A LOT going on right now with the financial aid and college admission processes, but don't get overwhelmed! Here's a recap of tasks you should complete this fall to stay on track to college.

- 1) Complete the Free Application Federal Student for (FAFSA) – opens in December
 - First, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You'll need it to access and sign the FAFSA.
 - Review our FAFSA Checklist for a list of items to gather before you start the form.
 - Complete the FAFSA fafsa.gov. You may also complete it via the new myStudentAid app for iOS and Android.

- For free personal help, you can call EducationQuest to make an appointment: Omaha 888.357.6300, Lincoln 800.303.3745, Kearney 800.666.3721, or Scottsbluff -800.303.3745, ext. 6654.
- 2) Apply to your top college choices. Hopefully by now, you have some top choices for colleges. Now is a good time to apply to them! Most colleges have a free application process (exceptions are the University of Nebraska and KState), so you won't be out of anything if you apply and change your mind later on. Once you apply, let Ms. Hermsmeier know and you can be added to the Applied to College Wall. J As always, if you need help, stop by Mrs. Hermsmeier's office.
- 3) Retake the ACT and/or SAT. Colleges use vour best scores for college admission and scholarships. Register by November 8 for the December 14 ACT.
- 4) Get serious about applying for scholarships. See ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org for Nebraskabased scholarships and a list of national search sites. You can also visit the counselor's website off of the school website at https:// sites.google.com/meridianmustangs. org/school counselor.

Juniors...start researching colleges If you narrow your college choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful.

Here's how to get started:

1) Review College Profiles at Education Quest.org information about colleges in Nebraska and across country and/or the College Handbook Counselors Office. If you're interested in an out-of-state school, check out the Midwest Student Exchange Program to learn about tuition discounts.

2) Meet with representatives who visit your school, and then visit the websites of the colleges that interest you to learn more about the schools.

Once you've narrowed your choices, schedule campus visits. Try to visit in the spring of your junior year while colleges are still in session. Remember to get a sign-out sheet from the office BEFORE you go on your college

Please join us in honoring all the men and women who have served our country.


